NSW Announces changes to CTP Insurance scheme in NSW (It's on again)

As predicted by the Motorcycle Council of NSW earlier this year, the NSW Government has opted to shake up the NSW Compulsory Third Party Insurance Scheme using Option 3.

The announcement was snuck out on the Thursday before the July 2 Federal election so as to minimise noise about the proposal to change the system in favour of the insurers. The announcement read something like this;

The short story on the reforms is;

- Compensation payments to injured victims will be capped
- 90% of injured victims will not be able to have legal assistance with their claim
- Benefits will be paid to the drivers that cause the crash that injures you or yours whilst your entitlement will be cut
- Adding an extra 7,000 claimants, (the drivers that cause the crash) is supposed to reduce the cost of a Greenslip some how
- Expected reductions in Greenslips is estimated to be 10% over the coming years but just as in 2013, they can't tell you how it will happen, just that it will
- Victims medical care will cease after a period of time just like the current Workcover debacle that sees injured workers booted off the Insurance system after 2 years
- It is expected that Medicare will have to take up the slack instead of the Insurance companies for injuries after the exclusion period
- There will be an "Expert Panel" to assess the changes proposed led by John Della Bosca who was the architect of the Workcover changes and his second will be Nancy Milne Deputy Chair of the SIRA (old MAA) board. The same group that has us is in the current position of paying too much for our Greenslips on motorcycles.
- There is little doubt that Motorcycle Premiums will go up and any entitlements will go down so you as a rider can expect to pay more for less.

Now is the time to write to your local member and to the Christian Democrats asking why the CTP system can't be better managed instead of just being cut to pieces? Let them know that after the miserable 45 cents in the dollar that goes to the victims, the next biggest winner are the insurance companies who pull out 19% profit and 15% costs for a whopping 34 cents in the dollar to pay for their Corporate Credit cards etc. Cutting compensation to injured

victims goes against the whole concept of CTP for which the scheme was originally set up. Victims are entitled to adequate compensation for their injuries and the system should not be a cash cow for others.

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Motorcycle Crash Card Launch and Ride

On 26th June riders met at Kangaroo Point for the media launch of the Motorcycle Crash Card system.

Lesley Tipping, the Hornsby Shire Road Safety Officer (RSO) has secured permissions to distribute the Motorcycle Crash Card. The idea behind this is to have a card inside your helmet with necessary medical details and contact numbers on it. There is a sticker placed on the outside of the helmet so paramedics know it is there and can be accessed.

Following the launch and media there was a short ride to Pie in the Sky with a tonne of riders taking part. The Crash Card has generated national interest and is available from either Hornsby local council, the MCC at the general meetings or from MCAS City store.

The event was supported by NSW Police and Ambulance. Crash card: The piece of paper that could save the lives of Australian motorcycle riders

How to use the crash card

Complete the requested details on the card then place it in the lining of your helmet, as that is where emergency services will look for it.

Name: First and surnames are best. Please avoid nicknames
Date of birth: DD/MM/YYYY
Post code: From your current address
Blood type: A+ (for example)
Allergies: List the medication you are allergic to
Medical history: If you have had any operation in the last 12 months and/or suffer a chronic illness eg diabetes, asthma, angina etc
Medication: List any medications you currently take
Emergency contact: List name and contact phone number of the person you wish to be informed of your situation



REMEMBER removing a crash helmet is a skill which takes two people and is practised by trained personnel.

DON'T ever attempt to remove another rider's helmet on your own.

HELP ALERT RESPONDERS TO YOUR CRASH CARD
 PLACE THE RED DOT ON THE RIGHT HAND CORNER OF YOUR VISOR/HELMET, MAKING SURE IT'S NOT IN YOUR FIELD OF VIEW - IT IS SAFE TO STICK ON ANY HELMET.



Remove the crash card from this leaflet and fill out your details using a ball point pen. Write clearly so that if the card is ever needed it is legible for the emergency services at the scene.

Place the card in the lining of your crash helmet.

Peel the Crash Card sticker from this leaflet and affix it to the right hand side of your helmet or visor, making sure that it does not affect your visibility.

Emergency service personnel at the scene will look for the sticker on the right side of your helmet. Pass the spare card and sticker to a friend or your pillion passenger.

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MCC Submissions over the past month

The MCC has made a number of submissions over the past month including;

- **A response to the CTP/Greenslips Options Paper**
 - The Government wishes to change the CTP system by capping compensation to injured parties
 - They also want a No Fault scheme and this will negatively impact motorcycle Greenslips
- **Submission to the Law & Justice Committee of inquiry into CTP in NSW**
 - This is an inquiry into the management of the CTP/Greenslip scheme
- **Staysafe Committee of inquiry into Autonomous (Driverless) Cars**
 - Driverless cars, what are the dangers and ethical responsibilities?
 - What are the insurance impacts?
- **M5 Traffic Management Plan**
 - Making comment to ensure that the system adheres to the standards and references motorcycles

For further details on these submissions feel free to approach the committee at the next general meeting 6 June.

The MCC will also be appearing in front of the L&J Inquiry into the CTP scheme and Staysafe Autonomous vehicles inquiry.

First Aid For Motorcyclists

As many of us know, having the skills and the knowledge derived from the FAFM course could well save someone's life.

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Recreational Registration scheme for trail bikes

After some years of lobbying for a rec rego scheme for enduro bikes and the NSW Roads and Ports Minister's announcement in July 2014, we are pleased to announce that the stakeholder engagement process is well and truly underway. The MCC has been involved in a number of meetings on this matter and various other stakeholders are also being brought on board to enable maximum input from various ride associations. We will keep you up to date with developments as they occur but we do expect a result in the not too distant future.

Standards Australia Helmet Forum

The Standards Australia forum on whether or not we should maintain/upgrade/twilight the AS/NZS1698:2006 standard for helmets was a well-attended event with representatives from various NSW and interstate Government bodies along with Federal representatives and a number of importers, manufacturers, researchers Crashlab staff and a representative from the Conformity Assessment Bodies (CABs). The MCC had representation from Guy Stanford, Bob Madell and Christopher Burns. Whilst the forum raised more questions than answers it certainly gave the Federal bodies something to think about. Some people were of the opinion that there was an undercurrent of vested interests in the conversations but that probably depends upon ones frame of reference.

The prediction by many of the advocates is the standard has a place and there is no need to close it off immediately but there is equally no reason to upgrade or modify the standard either. We look forward to receiving the notes from the forum in the near future.

National road toll (to 31 May 2016)

Motorcycle fatalities in Australia in the 12 months to 31 May 2016 have risen by 12 per cent (from 203 to 228) compared with the previous 12 months — versus a 9.8 per cent rise across all road users over the same period. Motorcycle fatalities are up by 22 per cent (from 187 to 228) in the 12 month period ending in May 2014. Meanwhile in NSW the figure remains on par with other years.

Motorcyclists: up 12.3 per cent (203 to 228)

Motorcycle fatalities in NSW year to date is one more than 2015 at 27

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Road Safety's Motorcycle Safety Implementation Working Group

Another very positive meeting held on 26th May 2016 with the following issues being discussed:-

1. Staysafe Inquiry

The Government's response to Staysafe's recommendations on motorcycle safety have been released <https://www.parliament.nsw.gov.au/committees/inquiries/Pages/inquiry-details.aspx?pk=2058> The Government's response aligns well with Staysafe's recommendations and therefore the MCC submission

The CRS's next 3 Year Action Plan is close to being released, we were reassured there won't be any surprises.

2. Matching Hospital and Police crash data

Since the CRS started to match hospital data to Police data, they have been able to dig into what type of injuries motorcyclists sustain in crashes. The presentation highlighted there is much more that can be done with this data. Only about 50% of motorcycle hospitalisations can be matched to a Police report. Obviously many riders are turning up at hospital without filling in a Police report. Many of these turn up in an ambulance.

3. Post Licence Training

This project still has some way to go before the CRS decides how best to proceed. It is generally agreed something needs to be done to improve rider post-licence competencies.

4. Emergency Phones

There was discussion on how best to prioritise where to place satellite emergency phones. 2 MCC delegates surveyed the Snowies over the Anzac Day long weekend. They found several areas where motorcyclists have a tendency to crash do not have any mobile reception. The Snowies tend to be further down the priority list than the MCC would like. We'll keep working on this.

5. Crash Cards

Chief Inspector Phil Brooks presented information on an initiative by the Road Safety Officer for Hornsby Council to provide crash cards to be inserted into helmets to assist emergency services in the event of a crash. The RSO had already approached the MCC for support, which we will be providing. The launch for this initiative was on Sunday 26th June at Brooklyn

6. Protective Clothing 5 Star Rating Scheme

The session on protective clothing was relatively brief. This project is generating its own momentum. It is hoped that someone to run the 5 Star scheme will be appointed late this year.

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7. Top Rub Rails

Following the last Implementation Working Group meeting the MCC wrote to the CRS suggesting the CRS should initiate a program to test top rub rails. The MCC's suggestion is under discussion.

The next meeting will be at the end of August.

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NSW Road Rule Changes Effective Friday 1 July 2016

Once again lobbying and advocacy work by the Motorcycle Council of NSW in conjunction with the Australian Motorcycle Council has borne fruit with the introduction of road rule changes in NSW effective from Friday 1 July 2016.

The changes that take effect are;

Rule 270 – A motorcycle rider who is pushing a motorcycle does not have to wear a helmet, if the engine is not running and it is safe to do so.

Rule 271(1A) (a) – A motorcycle rider may stand on the footrests of a motorcycle provided it is safe to do so, for example to help them maintain control on roads with potholes or loose gravel.

Rule 271(1A) (b) – A motorcycle rider may remove a foot from the footrest when it is safe to do so, for example to stretch.

These changes brought about by the work of the MCC and AMC will benefit riders across the state so a big thank you to Guy Stanford and Christopher Burns for their efforts in bringing about these changes. It just shows what can be achieved through sensible conversations.

MCC FAQ's

A motorcycle dealer on the south coast approached the MCC for information that could be used to help his customers. As a result a series of Frequently Asked Questions has been prepared so customers questions can be answered and to guide them as to where to find detailed information on the MCC's website. These FAQs will be uploaded onto the MCC website so they are available to a wider range of riders.
